

THE HUNTS

Backpack and horseback hunting is our specialty. Horses are utilized on approx 1/2 of our hunts, wherever the terrain allows us, as they provide access to vast country and give many of our clients a better, overall hunting experience. Most of our sheep and goat hunts require some backpacking, even when horses are used. We have increased our horse herd to 30 animals and have nearly 200 miles of maintained trails within the area. By doing both backpack and horseback hunts, we can utilize the country better and spread the hunting pressure out over the entire area, so that each hunter has a realistic opportunity of taking trophy class game and of having a quality and personalized experience. All hunts are 1x1 guided, unless a 2x1 is requested and all sheep hunts include an additional guide/assistant. If requested, we can provide an additional assistant/packer on any hunt. Wranglers and assistants are utilized to maximize hunting time. Most hunts start and end at one of our 4 base camps, which are equipped with log structures and/or heated cabins. From there, hunters leave with a string of horses or are dropped at a remote lake via floatplane, depending on the animal and area being hunted. Most of the hunts are spot and stalk. Calling is also utilized during the moose rut, but early season, spot and stalk moose hunting is very successful. Our goat is to conduct hunts which produce results. Hunter success includes hard work on everyone's part. Our equipment is some of the best in the industry and no corners have been cut. Most of our hunts are challenging and rewarding, for those who want a fair



chase hunt in some of the most scenic and wild country found anywhere in the world. Most of our hunts require better than average hunter skill, experience and physical fitness and are not for 1st time hunters, especially bowhunters. All hunts start/end in the town of Smithers, BC (daily flights from Vancouver, BC to Smithers). The scenic floatplane (Turbine Otter, Beaver, Wilga or Cessna 185) flight to camp takes approximately 2 hours each way.

THE AREA

Our original area is approximately 1,100 square miles in size. For the last 4 seasons, we have leased a portion of 2 bordering hunting concessions. These leased areas more than double the size of our original area, bringing the total size to over 1.6 million acres of exclusive hunting area. Hunting pressure is light. The entire area is very mountainous; there are numerous lakes and rivers throughout the territory, most with excellent fishing. The major watersheds are the Finlay, Thudaka, Kwadacha, Kechika, Jackstone and Frog Rivers. We are located in North Central BC, approximately 150-200 miles south of the Yukon border, and dead center, between the Cassiar and Alaska Highways. Stone Sheep, Mountain Goat, Mountain Caribou, Canada Moose, Rocky Mountain Elk, Grizzly, Black Bear & Wolf are hunted here.

2007 HUNT REPORT

We hunt the scenic Cassiar and Rocky Mountains of Northern British Columbia, Canada. There are no roads and little resident hunting pressure in this isolated piece of Canadian Wilderness. 2007 was our 9th year of operation, so we know the area and our game animals very well. We hunted a few new areas this year and took a few hunters into each of our proven and established areas. By not over hunting any one area and by trying to take only mature animals, we increase hunter success with a more personalized hunt, and it is good game management. Our hardworking, enthusiastic and experienced staff, combined with good food, comfortable camps and high quality equipment provides a memorable hunt. We revised and updated several of our base camps again this year and repaired some of the important horse and hiking trails.

This business is owned and operated by Bryan Martin, who has been involved in the hunting/outfitting industry since 1991. He is a hands-on owner, and extremely serious mountain hunter, personally involved with the planning of every hunt. He also guides 4-6 hunts each year, with a focus on Stone Sheep and Grizzly. Bryan's right hand man is Dawson Deveny. Dawson has been with the company from the beginning and has become a versatile hunter and exceptional guide. Our entire crew works hard to ensure that every hunter has a successful, memorable and personalized hunting experience. In addition to his Canadian Operation, Bryan operates Asian Mountain Outfitters, LLC which organizes, provides guides, and films hunts in Central Asia, specializing in Marco

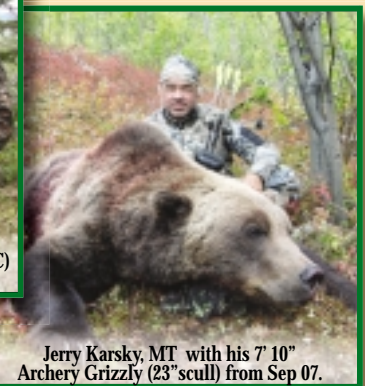

Our 2007 Sheep season was a bit more challenging than we had anticipated due in part to poor weather, rough terrain, a hard winter, scattered sheep and all around difficult hunting. We leased and hunted some new country, and it took us longer than we had anticipated to locate legal rams in these areas. Many miles were covered with backpacks, but our hunters were persistent and many were successful. The 6 rams taken averaged just over 8 ½ years old, and were 34 – 38” long. Other than the 38” (160 B&C) ram, the biggest sheep are still alive and many of the 7 ½ year old rams we saw will be legal in 2008. Our one archery sheep hunter stalked to within 100-200 yards of good rams, on 4 different occasions, and was a great hunter, but the wind caused us grief and spooked the rams every time. As you can see by the photos, our rams have dark capes. In the last five seasons, 40 sheep hunters have taken a total of 30 rams for a 75% success rate, which is higher than the industry average. Our Stone Sheep hunts are challenging, but if you arrive in good shape, your odds of taking a good ram are high. Grizzly hunting was again exceptional. Our 3 rifle hunters shot big old bears, in less than 10 days of total hunt time. Two of the three were huge both squaring over 8’ with 23 ¼ - 24” skulls. Our only archery hunter saw numerous bears, and he shot a huge boar, just short of 8’ and with a 23” skull, early in his hunt. Since 1999, we have taken a total of 11 archery grizzly and our success rate is unmatched in the industry, with either a rifle or bow. Grizzly hunters should have a legitimate chance of taking a boar with a

22-24 inch skull and 7.5-8.5 foot squared hide. These hunts can be physically challenging, but if you are looking for a true, interior Grizzly, our hunts are as good as they get and the best all around hunt we offer. It is one of the best hunts in North America. Mountain Caribou hunting takes place from mid-August to mid-October. The best hunting, because of the rut and their beautiful white capes, is from mid-September until October 15th. Our largest bull was right at 375 gross B&C, with many others in the 330-360 range. We saw several much larger bulls, but none were taken. They should be even bigger in 2008, as antler growth was down this year due to a cold, wet spring. Year in and out, we average 350-360 B&C class caribou each year; approximately 15% of the caribou taken will score over 400 gross. Hunters, who are willing to turn down average bulls and hunt hard, have a realistic chance of taking a record class animal. Canada Moose hunting was good this year, but like the caribou, antler growth was slightly down. Three of the bulls scored over 185 gross B&C. Our biggest moose was 54” wide and scored 194 gross. The widest was 61.5 inches, but didn’t score as high. Again, the width average was 51-52”. Similar to last year, the biggest moose seen (estimated at over 210) is still out there. Mountain Goat hunting was great, other than a two week period in late September and early October, when we got pounded by heavy snow and wind. The average size, year in and year out, is 9”. The largest goat we took this year was 10 ¼”. A large percentage of the goats were between 9 – 9 ½”. Late August and early September is

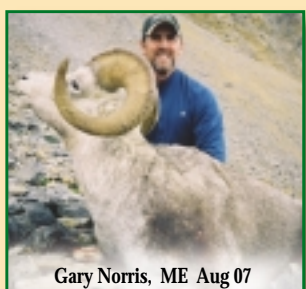

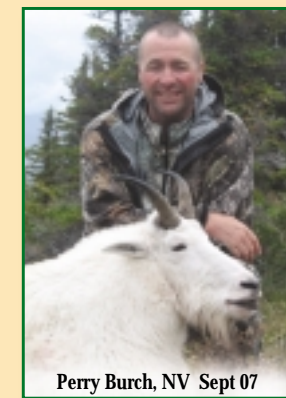

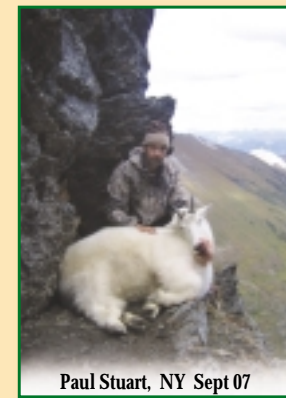

the best time to hunt for goats if you want bigger horns and better weather. On these earlier hunts, the weather is warmer, there is less snow, the days are longer and the country is more accessible. If hunters are looking for goats with really long hair, a hunt in mid-late September or early October is the best, but these later hunts require hunters to be resilient and physically fit and you could loose several days due to weather. Because of the weather issues we faced in 2007, I won't be offering any 6 day goat hunts in September or October, just 8, 10 or 12 day trips. This was our most successful year with wolves, with 5 being taken by our hunters and/or guides. Several black bears were seen, but none were taken. In summary, 2007, was a good season, but the weather challenging. With the previously long winter and cold spring, animals were scattered and hunting was more difficult than in 2006. If the weather is a bit milder this winter and spring, our 2008 hunting season should be better. If you are looking for a highly successful and true wilderness hunt for trophy class animals, we can provide that. I'd again like to thank all of our quality hunters, excellent pilots: Mac Blackwell of Ootsa Air and Wendel and Armen of Alpine Lakes Air, our Smither's expeditor, Suzanne Morgan, hardworking guides and staff for a memorable 2007.
